Workforce Development

Assists residential clients with resumes, job searches, and interview skills

Provides a caring environment and educational activities for infants, toddlers, and schoolaged children of parents living in our residential programs

FOOD + HOUSING

Community Kitchen

Serves 1,300+ meals/day to homeless and hungry community members; including 3 meals/day for Eva's residents

Shelters for Men & Women

Offers safe shelter & supportive services. Capacity: 34 women & 29 men (more in cold weather)

Family Shelter

Hope Residence offers safe shelter and supportive services.

Capacity: 10 parents & up to 18 of their children

Transitional Housing

Capacity: 8 parents working towards permanent housing and 18 of their children

Eva's Village Apartments

Capacity: 50 units of affordable, permanent housing with on-site supportive services

FY 2019 Expenses & Revenue - July 1, 2018 - June 30, 2019

Eva's Village is funded through three main sources:

- Government Grants—Partnerships with State of NJ, Passaic County, and the City of Paterson to deliver contracted services
- Fee-for-Service-Billable revenue for clinical services, through Medicaid and other State of NJ initiatives
- Private Donations-Generous gifts from individuals, private foundations, corporations, religious and civic organizations

Only 13% of our total budget is spent on administrative and fundraising expenses, meaning that private dollars go where they are needed most – to delivering vital care to the men, women, and children who rely on us for help and hope.
